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
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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dr. Gena Lew Gong is an instructor in Asian American Studies at Fresno City College; she has also been a lecturer in the Asian American Studies Program at Fresno State since 2012. Dr. Gong has over 30 years of experience working in the nonprofit sector and has held numerous leadership positions, including President of Central California Asian Pacific Women, Executive Director of the Asian Pacific Community Fund, Director of Planning and Development for A New Way of Life Reentry Project, and Director of Public Policy & Communications for Leadership Education for Asian Pacifics (LEAP). A committed lifelong learner, in 2015, Gena joined a hālau to learn hula alongside her (then) 5- year-old daughter and in 2019, placed third in her first hula competition. In 2020, to help combat loneliness and acquaint others with technology while sharing her love of tasting and testing new recipes, she launched an online community, GG Cooks, and led weekly cooking classes over Zoom.

On the first Sunday of every month, she helps set up and clean up the communion served by her church and serves in place of her dad who passed away two years ago in August. Since his departure, Callie and her family have found ways to manage their daily lives and grow both individually and together. Callie aspires to find a balance between her cultural identities as a Chinese-Indonesian American.

Graduate Recipient

Emahlia Power grew up in Modesto, California, but her family came to the United States after fleeing the Khmer Rouge. She attended San Francisco State University and double-majored in Asian American Studies and Communications and grew a love for helping the AAPI community during this time and participated in research with Stop AAPI Hate. After graduating from SFSU, she moved to Idaho on a whim and realized that her knowledge about Asian Americans and diverse communities is more useful in Idaho than in California. Idaho, specifically Boise, has flourishing diverse populations and is learning how to navigate creating visibility. Currently, Emahlia is employed with the International Rescue Committee, working with refugees that arrive in Boise. She will be attending Boise State University in Fall 2023, pursuing her Master's in Public Administration with the hopes to keep helping minority communities in Idaho.



ASHLEEN SODHI

Graduate Recipient

As an Asian Indian woman, Ashleen Sodhi was raised by her elderly Nani (grandmother) while her immigrant parents worked full-time, blue-collar jobs. Ashleen's Nani always taught her to use her culture and values as a strength to reach for the stars. Her Sikh values emphasize the importance of seva ("selfless service") in order to empower the community around her. For Ashleen, healthcare became her form of seva through devoting her energy as a hospice volunteer, certified nursing assistant (CNA) in long-term rehabilitation, and a medical assistant (MA) in pain management. These experiences further motivated Ashleen to pursue her Master's in Physician Assistant studies at Keck Graduate Institute in Claremont, CA. She hopes to utilize this degree to provide equitable, unbiased care to all minority populations and become a voice for those who have been silenced. As a future physician assistant (PA), it is her primary goal to not only advocate for her patients but to also encourage them to advocate for their own health. Ashleen's desire to fight barriers to equal healthcare and empower the Asian Pacific Islander community to strive for their aspirations regardless of the roadblocks holding the community back.



DEBBIE TOM MCCRAY SCHOLARSHIP

Advocate. Teacher. Community Builder. Mother. Debbie was all of these things and dedicated her life to teaching others and building communities. Her early career focused on refugees and housing in Fresno, including the first Habitat for Humanity build in Fresno. She welcomed the first wave of Hmong refugees. She helped create a group of women who would soon call themselves CCAPW. Her work with Hmong refugees in Fresno led to work in Boston, MA. The influx of refugees from Vietnam, Laos, Russia, and various parts of Africa created more division in an already polarized state, but Debbie supported them all in their paths to receive diplomas, start businesses, and create communities. Debbie brought together Asian youth from around the state to participate in the largest conference for Asian youth in the United States that turned into a coalition: Coalition for Asian Pacific American Youth (CAPAY). After 2002, she moved back to Fresno. Debbie married long-time friend, Fredrick McCray, and picked up CCAPW again. For the next 20 years, she would often exclaim, "YAY! Another successful Asian Woman! I love it!" and encouraged them to "take up space." Her life of service and support will be remembered by this award.

SOREATH HOK

Graduate Recipient



Soreath Hok is an award-winning journalist at KVPR who covers local government, politics and other local news. She is a 2022 National Edward R. Murrow Award winner. In the fall of 2023, she begins her first year in Fresno State's Creative Writing Program. Soreath began her journalism career in Fresno, graduating from Fresno State with a B.A. in English and a minor in Mass Communication & Journalism. Her first media job at KFSR, the campus radio station, helped to launch her career in broadcast news. She worked as a producer at two Fresno stations, KMPH FOX 26 and KSEE 24, before moving to KCRA 3 in Sacramento.

After more than a decade behind-the-scenes as a producer, Soreath explored other creative outlets outside of news in advertising, marketing, and social media. A Cambodian-American, Soreath has had the opportunity to report on mental health issues affecting the Cambodian community amongst survivors of the Khmer Rouge genocide in the 1970s. At KVPR, she completed a five-part series as a part of her 2022 California Fellowship with the USC Annenberg Center for Health Journalism. She continues to explore this topic for the 2022-2023 Rosalynn Carter Fellowship for Mental Health Journalism.

MAE TAKAHASHI SCHOLARSHIP

Mae Takahashi was the founding president of CCAPW. She pioneered the development of a Central California organization of Asian Pacific women by modeling sister Asian and Pacific Islander women's organizations in Los Angeles and the Bay Area. She established the Central Valley's participation in state and national APW networks. Mae initiated and oversaw the governance issues of the organization's nonprofit status and planted the seeds for the organization's successful review of over 25 years. She was an integral part of improving the status of API women in the Central Valley. Today our membership of community activists, professionals, educators, health providers, businesswomen, and Asian and Pacific Islander organizational and community leaders continues the CCAPW mission in her honor and memory.

SHAYLA SAKKAKHANAUNE

Undergraduate Recipient

Shayla Sakkakhanaune is the eldest daughter of a Lao and Thai family and says she inherits her sense of perseverance and love for soccer from her dad. She began playing soccer when she was four. Determined to continue her efforts, Shayla sent countless emails inviting college coaches to her high school games and was recruited by the coach at Whittier College. She is majoring in Sociology and minoring in Public Health where she inherited her sense of initiative and began a chapter at Whittier for the nonprofit Team Awareness Combating Overdose (TACO), dedicated to preventing drug overdoses on-campus by distributing Fentanyl testing strips. She hopes to later pursue a PhD program in Sociology and become a professor at a community college, serving as a mentor for students at a transitional period in their lives, and researching underrepresented Lao and Thai populations. Shayla is currently a Mellon Mays fellow investigating how different factors influence the likelihood to donate organs for Lao and Thai Americans.
